# 1928 Pickaway Neighbors Helping Neighbors

This transcribed newspaper article from more than 110 years after the Wertmans came to Pickaway County, Ohio shows that the same spirit of community cooperation was active among the neighbors. mentioned were their cousins as well as neighbors.

Circleville Herald, November 3, 1928 --Friends, Neighbors Gather Golden Grain of Farm Couple, Ill

This week persons driving past the corn fields of Byron Bolender in Washington-twp, saw a beautiful and unusual sight. There were 50 or more men working fast and systematically, some husking the golden ears of corn from the fodder, others hauling the corn to the cribs.

These men were neighbors, friends and brother members in Washington Grange No. 2240, of Mr. and Mrs. Byron Bolender who have been seriously ill with typhoid fever for a number of weeks. They are now reported to be convalescent.

The love and friendship of a neighbor and a fraternal brother are to be more appreciated than silver and gold, and Mr. and Mrs. Bolender will never forget what their fellow members in the Washington Grange did for them in this time of illness.

# My Ancestors at the Early Wertman Reunions

In 2000 the Wertman Family Association was formed and rejuvenated the Wertman Reunions. Reunions have been held in every year from 2000 to 2019, but not in 2020 due to the pandemic. The original Wertman Reunions were held from 1920 to the late 1930s. However, we have little or no information about many of these reunions. The only information available, which is in the Wertman Family Association archives, are the lists of attendees from each reunion between 1922 and 1932, the minutes of the business or board meetings from 1924-28 and 1934-37, and a few miscellaneous documents.

We assume the reunions started in 1920 because the 1924 business meeting minutes say that the 1924 reunion was the 5th Annual Reunion. We do not have any information on: (1) how the reunions started; or (2) the first few reunions. According to interviews with his uncles by Russ Dannecker, these early reunions ended because of the Depression and the onset of World War II; the cost of getting together became too great. Nearly all of these early reunions were held at Victory Park in Slatington, PA. The only one that we definitely know to have been held in a different place was the 1934 reunion at Ontelaunee Park in Pennsylvania.


The attendance was significantly larger than our current reunions. In 1924 there were 286 people, including 54 children. In most other years for which we have complete attendance data, the children were not included in the attendance lists, but adult attendance was 233 in 1926, 172 in 1927, 207 in 1930, 158 in 1931, and 212 in 1932. For the reunions, printed programs and badges were prepared. For


example, in 1925, 600 invitation postcards, 300 programs, and 400 badges were prepared. In a tradition restarted at the 2002 reunion, the original reunions gave prizes for the person who travelled the longest distance, the youngest attendee, and the oldest man and oldest woman.

I have become interested in these early reunions because of the central role my ancestors, all of whom lived in Catasauqua, PA, played in them. My great grandfather, Henry J. Wertman (1870-1943), was the Treasurer of the Wertman Reunion from at least 1924 to 1935. His son, my grandfather, Robert A. Wertman Sr. (1896-1968), was the Secretary of the Wertman Reunion from at least 1924 to 1935, the same office I have held in the WFA since 2015. My great grandfather Henry, my great grandmother Susan E. Wertman nee Wuest (1868-1858), my grandfather Robert, my grandmother Isabel S. Wertman (1889-1935), my great uncle Clarence E. Wertman, and great aunt Ida S. Wertman all attended many of these early reunions. many of the lists of attendees, these six people were listed first. Many of them were also members of various committees involved in the planning of the reunions. In addition, my father Robert A. Wertman Jr. (1919-2005) attended many of the early reunions as a boy.

Henry J. Wertman, his wife Susan, and his two sons Robert and Clarence, moved Catasaugua, PA from Jersey City, NJ in March 1908. He purchased the Eagle Livery of Catasauqua from the executors of the estate of his brother George F. Wertman, who died on February 14, 1908. Henry leased the Pennsylvania Hotel Stables (on Bridge Street at the back of the hotel) and moved the livery (a business of keeping horses for hire) there. The family initially settled on Third Street in Catasauqua. Henry later owned a gasoline station.

## The Wertman Gene Pool

Regular readers may be aware that there is a Wertman Family Association DNA Project. We initially tested male volunteers for 43 Y-Chromosome STR (Short Tandem Repeats) markers at the Sorenson Molecular Genealogy Foundation. With the closing of SMGF, we moved to a 37-marker test at Family Tree DNA. These results have been standardized and combined on the WFA DNA Project website, <www.bit.ly/wfadna>;.

Phase 1 used the test results of men of known Wertman ancestry to determine the probable haplotype of George Philip Wertman, who settled in Lynn Township, Bucks (later Northampton, now Lehigh) County, Pennsylvania in 1749 by assigning the most common value at each marker as his most likely value. Phase 2 was used to determine if men of unknown ancestry are somehow related to GPI.

Phase 3 attempts to identify GPI's origins using SNP (Single-Nucleotide Polymorphism) tests. These tests organize men into increasingly detailed haplogroups. In the beginning, all males were members of Haplogroup A. Eventually, some mutated to B. Then, C and so forth. This is a large scale but very detailed genealogical descendancy chart ending with each man's specific haplogroup.

FTDNA predicted our Wertman line to be R-M269 which a very broad haplogroup. Another company, GeneTree further refined this prediction to R-U152 which is still overly general. We did some SNP testing and discovered our Wertman line to be R-Z35, still not specific enough. These early tests looked at specific SNPs to determine a positive or negative result. At that time there were several possibilities, so testing each one was clearly not an option.

Then, science happened. FTDNA began to offer Big Y. This is an exploratory test that identifies both named (known) variants and private (previously unknown) variants specific to one individual. Once a private variant s found in two or more men, it is named and placed in the phylogenetic tree, the descendancy tree mentioned above. The list of known SNPs has grown from several hundred in the mid-2000s to several hundred thousand today.

# What is the point of all of this?

Age estimates say our most recent known terminal SNP (R-BY164497) arose several thousand years ago. More helpful in anthropology than genealogy. But our test subject still has 33 private/unnamed variants. As more men test, matches will be found, new SNPs will be named and age estimates will become more accurate eventually moving into the genealogical timeframe. Then, we can begin to see the migration path our Wertman ancestors.

The database size is growing slowly due to the relatively high costs involved and the complexity of analyzing the results. It is very much an early adopter test.

# **Werthmann Baptism Germany**

These baptismal records from Ulm, Germany make reference to a Werdemann or Werthemann as the mother of two Leists (List). Ulm is a well-known city on the Danube River, not too far from the Southern part of the Rhine area. Coincidentally it is also the proven location of my ancestral Merz family!

# When Grandfather Played William Tell with a Rifle

Most people who are interested in genealogy have learned not to believe all the family stories. But occasionally, there are those stories that prove to be true.

My grandfather John Gideon Laidacker (1867-1927) was a 3rd great grandson of George Philip Wertman through his mother Christiana Wertman (1836-1890) (Gideon, Heinrich, Johan Michael, GPW I). For most of his life, he worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad and as an antique dealer. From about 1899 he was station agent in St. Clair, PA until moving to a position in Mocanaqua, PA in 1908.



A family story about John Gideon's prowess as a marksman was confirmed by the following 1925 article from an unknown newspaper (perhaps the Shickshinny, PA Mountain Echo) headlined: "Mocanaqua Man is Crack Shot":

In addition to being the agent at Mocanaqua, Pennsylvania, J. G. Laidacker is a collector of relics, a connoisseur, and a "pug" on guns. He is also a "crack" shot, so "crack" indeed, that once he played the role of William Tell, who legend reminds us, shot an apple off the top of his friend's head.

The other night, a gang of "old timers" were discussing "ye olden days on the railroad," when Laidacker was station agent at St. Clair, a small-town west of Pottsville....

The yarn revolved around a patriarchal citizen [whom we shall call the P. C.] of the town who took great delight in using J. G.'s station for a smoking room.

Daily J. G. remonstrated with the P. C. Daily he pointed out the "no Smoking" sign. Daily the P. C. crossed his legs, smiled silently and contentedly, stroked his whiskers, and blew clouds of smoke through the room. Then, something happened to J. G. Had it occurred at this later day folks would say that the P. C. got J. G.'s "goat."

"Don't come back here tomorrow to smoke that pipe or I'll show you a thingertwo," J. G. is reported to have threatened the P. C. one day as he wigwagged an irate finger under his nose.

Next day the P. C. was at his accustomed post in the waiting room. Great clouds of smoke announced his presence to J. G. in the office. And J. G. proceeded to uncover the "thingertwo" that he had "up his sleeve." First, he reached for his rifle. Then he rested it in the screen of the window and took aim in approved "where the West begins fashion." Then he

pulled the trigger. Nothing wrong with his marksmanship. First worry gone. The P. C. which was his second worry was also gone. J. G. had shot the pipe from the mouth of the P. C. who immediately developed a fervent and permanent respect for J. G.'s "No Smoking" sign.

But there's the bullet still in imbedded in the waiting room wall in St. Clair. And J. G. doesn't deny the story.



# Ruth Beatrice Dannecker nee Wertman's, German Potato Salad.

Yield 6 to 8 Servings.

### **Ingredients**

- 2½ pound Potatoes, Yellow or Red
- 1 pound of thick cut, hickory smoked bacon, cut in small pieces
- . 1 large sweet onion, finely chopped
- ½ cup apple cider vinegar
- · ½ cup water
- 2 tablespoon and 2 teaspoon dark brown sugar
- . 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon brown or yellow mustard seed
- 1 teaspoon sweet mustard

### **Preparation:**

Place unpeeled potatoes in large saucepan. Add enough water to cover. Bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, 20 to 30 minutes or until potatoes are fork-tender. Drain. Let potatoes cool. Cut into small pieces; set aside.

Cut bacon into small pieces and cook in medium skillet over medium heat until crisp. Do not overcook. Remove with slotted spoon. Put into small bowl on paper towels; set aside.

Cook and stir onion in bacon droppings until tender.

Combine vinegar, water, sugar, salt, mustard seeds and mustered in large bowl. Add potatoes

onions and bacon. Toss until well coated. Serve hot or cold.

**NOTE:** This salad contains no eggs or mayonnaise and will keep for picnics or other outdoor meals.

Any member in good standing may submit up to one (1) nomination for each position that shall be forwarded to the Nominating Committee Chair, postmarked or electronically dated no later than thirty (30) days (22 July) before the Business Meeting (21 August) at the Wertman Family Annual Reunion. This serves as written notice of your opportunity to make a nomination. The Nominating Committee shall assemble any names submitted and those names which it recommends. Written permission from nominees shall be obtained before placing on ballot. Its report will be presented at the Annual Business meeting.

The offices up for election this year are: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Archivist, Webmaster, (all two-year terms) and two Directors at Large (both four-year terms). This year the four-year terms of Minerva Arner and Mary Ellen Wagner expire.
